

A self-described backyard naturalist, MARGARET RENKL is the author of three books of creative non-fiction and a collection of poetry, as well as a frequent columnist to *The New York Times*. In *Late Migrations* (2019), Renkl weaves a touching tapestry of childhood memories from rural Alabama with poetic reflections on nature, drawn from close observations in her suburban Nashville backyard. Addressing topics ranging from climate change and bird migrations to mental health struggles, Renkl's short essays emphasize how a deeper awareness of the natural world can enrich our humanity and strengthen our bond with nature as well as attachments to each other.
